It Is Later Than You Think by Evangelist Wil Rice IV

A few weeks ago, I took my son Weston to Linebaugh Library here

in Murfreesboro so he could check out some books for a research project. This was perhaps my third or fourth time to the new library, but I grew up going to the old Linebaugh Public Library. Getting a little nostalgic as I thought about the old library, I told Buster about it.

The old library was a grand old building with white pillars and steps that reminded me of something you might see in Washington, D.C. Signs pointing the way to the basement of the building indicated that it also served as a bomb shelter. And while I never sought refuge from Soviet bombs in that basement, I did find

my way there every Wednesday in the summer for the puppets and other programs they produced on a weekly basis. My mom would take me home every Wednesday with my quota of books and then return me the following Wednesday to check out new vol-

umes.

"So you see, Weston, this is the new library. I have only been here a time or two before," I told my son. I discovered that it must have been a while since my last visit, because I needed a new library card. The lady behind the desk told us how to find books on Andrew Jackson and then helped us when we returned with the bios in hand.

"How long has the new library been here?" I asked the librarian. She looked up. It was library—quiet. I listened for her answer. "The library has been here for twenty-five years." Gulp. Twenty-five years! I was a little taken back by how old the "new" library was! And then I was shocked by how old I must be. Why, half of the biographies in the place must have been written since the last time I had darkened the door of this "new" library!

After a growing number of recent incidents that illustrate the brevity of time, I have come to a conclusion: it is later than you think! As of the early spring day that I write this, we have encountered snow twice in the last three weeks in the last two states we have visited. And yet I know that it will be warm enough soon enough.

Things will start heating up very soon. Already, there is a growing energy, a building enthusiasm, and a sharpened focus, all of which tell me, "Summer is soon!" At the Ranch and West Branch, we are planning menus, making preparations for this year's Summer Staff, and firing up mowers and machines that have been in hibernation. And, just this week, our newest foal was born—a colt named King.

Revivals, Summer, and Camp

It was a simple message on my phone. After saying that her daughter was in the Patriot

Club at their church and that the youngster was writing about my father, a dear lady told me that this daughter was to provide "one interesting fact about Bill Rice, Jr." in the booklet. "Could you help my daughter with that?" she wanted to know.

One interesting fact about Dad? Sure, I could help. Let's see, he liked his steak rare. He almost always wore cowboy boots. He could explain just about anything—and you would understand it. He loved history. He was a little more than 6'2" but looked taller. He was seldom, if ever, late to anything, being time conscious. These are all facts, even if none of them may be interesting. So which one did I send her?

None of the above. Read on for the answer.

In the 1940s and into the 1950s, revivals provided their greatest attendance in the summer months. Television had not yet demanded a family's time every evening, and the summer break from school gave everyone more time. I do not believe that as many people traveled out of state on vacations then as they do now. So, since the summers were less busy for most families, revival meetings were normally well-attended. Many evangelists used tents, and others rented large auditoriums in the summers for revival crusades lasting usually two to four weeks.

When Dad and a pastor agreed on dates for

a revival campaign in the summer months, my father would suggest that the pastor rent the largest auditorium in town for the meetings. Evangelists did have revival campaigns in the spring and fall, of course, but summers provided the best opportunity for revivals.

But there was one problem.

Bill Rice wanted to preach to deaf people. And while a town might have ten thousand residents, less than twenty of those would be numbered in the deaf population.

While there might be only twenty or thirty deaf people in a given

community, the government said there were over eighteen million deaf people in the nation. How could Bill and Cathy Rice, who were burdened to reach those who were deaf, do so?

Their answer? Start a camp.

In 1950, Dad and Mother purchased the first nine hundred acres of what would become the Bill Rice Ranch. In 1953, they had their first camp with twelve deaf young people. And the rest is, as they say, history. My father gave up the very fruitful months of June, July, and August in revival campaigns and began a camp which, in the early days, had fewer than two hundred campers!

When I was a boy, I do remember two evangelists who had begun camps that were running in the 1950s; but almost every other evangelist was working in large revival campaigns.

Of course, that dynamic has changed completely now. Most evangelists I know spend their summers with camp ministries. Most churches do not have revival campaigns in the summer because their membership is either really busy or gone on vacation!

I have often heard of people who talk about the sacrifices that Bill and Cathy Rice made to begin the Bill Rice Ranch. And there were many. Finances provided a real challenge, of course. They had sold their home, and so there was no real "house" in which to live. Five years after the Bill Rice Ranch began, attendance numbered in the hundreds, whereas attendance in revival campaigns had numbered in the thousands!

Thousands of people do attend the Bill Rice Ranch every summer now, and that has been true since the mid-70s. But none of this would have been possible had not an evangelist and his wife determined to do exactly what God had led them to do, even if it meant reaching fewer people in the beginning days.

Interesting facts about Bill Rice may include the truth that he was over six feet in height and that he was always on time; but if you ever reminisce about Bill and Cathy, be sure to remember the fact that they did what God led them to do when He led them to do it. They did so fearlessly and joyfully; and sixty-five years later—in a changed world—you and I reap the benefits.


