You will have time to golf and go out with your friends every week when your children move out. But at that point, your children will not have time for you. So, **let's re-engage our** children by spending more time with them now!

What should time together look like? Well, it definitely doesn't involve an iPad! Engaged time with your child will be weekly one-on-one time that lasts at least an hour. It should be fun (not yard work) and focused (not distracted by texts and calls). It could include throwing a ball, taking a drive, getting ice cream, serving God and others, watching a ball game, taking a walk or bike ride, or starting a hobby. It should definitely include a lot of talking! Talk about their interests, friends, problems, and aspirations. Talk about their opinions of how you are doing as a parent and what you could do better. **The goal is you plugging into their heart and them plugging into yours.** The only way this will happen is if your heart is turned toward theirs (Malachi 4:6) and you spend a lot of quality time with them.

So how much quality time do you spend with your children? Do our kids get the *best* of our time or the *rest* of our time? We all wish it were more, so let us determine to change that by spending time reengaging!
