Struggle is not bad. **As parents, we need to be wise enough to allow struggle**. Our children will struggle the rest of their lives, even when dad and mom are not so close. So if you help them through their 2nd grade struggles, they'll be better prepared for their 3rd grade struggles, and one day they'll be prepared for life's struggles.

So what's your child struggling with right now? Do you feel it's your duty to separate them from all struggle? In doing so, we are preparing future adults to expect to have things handed to them. Instead, determine to prepare them beforehand, guide them through the process, and teach them life lessons along the way. Determine to lean into struggle and ditch the participation trophies.

Our Elementary students will be headed to the Wonders Center & Science Museum in Dixon, TN.


ATTENTION 2ND-8TH GRADERS
