

Jack of All Trades, Master of None (Part 1)

While the phrase “Jack of All Trades, Master of None” may describe many good people you know, it’s not meant to be a compliment. It usually describes a person who is mediocre in many things as opposed to someone who is excellent in a few. This might be handy around the house or while working on your vehicle; but when you choose an educational institution that you will trust your child to each day, it is not so handy! At BRCA, we strive to be excellent in all we do; but we don’t try to focus on everything. We focus on two areas – knowledge and character. Our goal is that each of our students will walk away from BRCA (at the end of the day and the year) better grounded in both of these areas. This month we are going to take a look at knowledge – what your child will gain spiritually and academically.

We believe there are two types of knowledge – biblical and academic. First of all, why emphasize **Bible knowledge and application**? Well, a child must learn key Bible truths in order to understand what it means to be saved from their sins. The Bible shows us our sinfulness, the punishment for sin, and our need of a Savior. Wonderfully, the Bible also reveals God’s love for us, Jesus’ payment for our sins on the cross, and the truth that we can have eternal life in heaven by simply trusting Jesus alone to forgive our sins, instead of relying on our own efforts. Each child is taught these truths in the first month of school. Once a student has trusted Christ for salvation, he or she needs to learn more of the Bible to discern between right and wrong and to shape a biblical conscience. The Bible convinces us of wrongdoing and shows the right path. Once a student begins to consider God’s opinion, his behavior will be affected. Yes, both teaching and applying the Word of God is a key aspect to instilling knowledge here at BRCA.


We also focus on instilling knowledge through **academics**. Our daily goal is to “give each student an excellent education.” (from our Mission Statement) Since day one, we have used the Abeka curriculum, and each of our teachers has been trained to use this curriculum and practice the biblical principle of “precept upon precept, line upon line.” (Isaiah 28:10) Those precepts include everything from intensive phonics and cursive writing in K4 to multiplication and division in 2nd grade to the writing process in 3rd grade and to percentages and square roots in 5th grade. It is said that Abeka is roughly one year ahead of most other curriculums. We believe this to be true because when our students take standardized tests, we typically score between one and one and a half grade levels above the average student taking these tests. We strive for excellence in academics.

We hope you see that instilling knowledge in each student is of utmost importance at BRCA. Character development is our second focus and is just as important to us. We will look at this next month.




Book of the Month
